A very similar walk to that of 8th June, our walk started from Abbots Well car park where there is one of the finest views across the New Forest. From there we walked across Hyde Common, the largest of the four commons of the Western New Forest Commons near Fordingbridge, covering 149 acres (61Ha) of open grassland and heathland scrub, grazed by animals owned by the local commoners. The common doubles as a shared village green between Hyde and Frogham, the local primary school uses the common as their playing fields. Just half a mile south of Hyde Common is the slightly smaller Gorley Common (100 acres). The majority of the site is a former gravel pit which now supports a mosaic of scrub and seasonally flooded acid grassland. There are several botanically rich seepage mires around the edge of the common. These are formed where springs emerge from the hillside.
