Alners Gorse Field Study

Alners Gorse lies between Kings Stag and Hazelbury Bryan in North Dorset. Butterfly Conservation purchased the land (14 hectares or 32 acres) as a reserve in 2005 which was funded by a legacy from Pamela Lewis, enabling them to preserve this fantastic site for butterflies. The land was bought from a local charitable trust the William Williams Charity. It is an important site for wildlife because it is one of the few relics of the heavily wooded landscape that used to make up the Blackmore Vale. Much of the land had been ploughed and drained and had lost the rich diversity of animals and plants that it must have once had. Butterfly Conservation's aim was to restore habitats after many years of neglect, through scrub control, removal of unwanted trees and grazing with four Dartmoor ponies, improving the habitats for butterflies such as the Marsh Fritillary along with other wildlife. It also supports flourishing populations of Nightingales and Brown Hairstreak butterflies which are dependent on blackthorn their larval foodplant, along with a very rich moth fauna including several nationally scarce species. Unfortunately the weather was against us so we did not see many butterflies including our target species Brown Hairstreak, although there were sightings reported a few days later.
