Durlston Country Park Walk

Durlston Castle and Country Park, situated 1 mile from Swanage in Dorset, is a 320 acre National Nature Reserve owned and managed by Dorset County Council. With its Tilly Whim Caves, originally excavated during the Napoleonic War, the limestone quarries were used up to the start of the 20th century. The galleries reach back deep into the Purbeck ridge in horizontal Jurassic strata. All of the stone excavated from the Tilly Whim quarries was shipped via sea using barges, a winch was used to lower the stone from the cliff face to the waiting barges below. Up to 50 tons of stone was removed in solid blocks from the galleries before being broken down into more manageable sizes using only hand tools. Removal of the stone to Swanage Bay using the barges could only be carried out in the summer months while the weather was calm enough. Further along the coast is Anvil Point Lighthouse, dramatic sea-cliffs where nesting Guillemots and Razorbills can be seen, also with coastal limestone downland, hay meadows, hedgerows and woodland. There are stunning views overlooking Peveral Point and Old Harry Rocks. Durlston is a gateway to the Jurassic Coast World Heritage Site which runs from Exmouth in the west to Old Harry Rocks at Ballard Down just north of Swanage. The Park is also designated as Heritage Coast, Special Area of Conservation, Site of Special Scientific Interest, Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and National Nature Reserve. The offshore waters are part of the Marine Research Area. This makes Durlston and the surrounding area a very special place for wildlife and geology.
