RINGWOOD NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY Wild Woodbury Walk

Date: 4th September 2025

Weather: Warm and sunny after early morning rain

Wild Woodbury is located in Bere Regis Dorset. The former farm was acquired in 2021 by Dorset Wildlife Trust for a large scale re-wilding project involving the local community. Dorset Wildlife Trust received donations and a land purchase grant from BCP Council and Dorset Council for land management changes to remove nitrogen inputs. This was achieved in the second year of the project by a landscape changing river restoration project to restore the headwaters of the River Sherford to allow it to take its natural course across the site. The land had been drained with a deep ditch and field drain system and the river could no longer be seen. By filling in the ditches to push the water out onto the land, blocking up the field drains and creating leaky dams, the once dry cracked landscape is now a mixture of large flows, pools and delta like areas, making the land more resilient to drought and filtering out excess nutrients out of the water and to help alleviate flash flooding downstream. This enabled the Councils to meet their duties to mitigate for impacts of increases in nitrates from development in Poole Harbour catchment and ensure there is no further deterioration of water quality in the harbour. A neighbouring farmer helps graze the site, Hereford Cattle, Exmoor Ponies and two Mangalitsa/Berkshire cross pigs have been introduced, we met the very friendly pigs 'Thelma and Louise', their presence has contributed to nature recovery. These changes have increased the amount of wildlife found throughout the 170 hectare site, we followed the two and a half mile waymarked route around some of it.
